Assignment:

2. Read Chapter 1 of your textbook: The Practice of Statistics (Starnes, Yates, Moore, 4th ed.)
3. Watch videos and complete Notetaking Guide (NTG) for Chapter 1
4. Complete Chapter 1 assignments. See the Unit 1 Summer Assignments for more information. All assignments will be uploaded to Coursesites. Email Mrs. Trundy if you are having trouble.

Resources/Supplies:

- You will need a **TI-84+ graphing calculator**. I strongly recommend any student going to attend a 4 year college to purchase one. If, however, you do not purchase one, I can check one out to you. Please have your parent/guardian sign the permission slip form. As soon as you return the permission slip to me I can check one out to you.
- I recommend a 2 -3 inch binder for this course. You will need it.
